As housing prices grow in communities across the country, affordability has become the defining challenge of today's housing landscape. Making housing cheaper and more available is one of the most fundamental economic issues that Congress needs to confront in order to ensure American competitiveness and the survival of the American dream. New Dems has consistently advocated for smart solutions to make communities where everyone has access to safe, decent, affordable housing and the amenities needed to thrive.

Our 2018 <u>Missing Millions of Homes Report, 20 for 2020 Policy Agenda</u>, 2021 <u>Infrastructure Priorities</u>, 2022 <u>Action Plan to Fight Inflation</u>, 2023 <u>Economic Opportunity Agenda</u>, and 2024 <u>Housing Action Plan</u> have steadily showcased New Dems' thought leadership on housing and proposed solutions to address the housing crisis. In keeping with New Dems' leadership on housing affordability, the Coalition endorses the following bills and ideas to build more housing and lower the cost to own or rent a home.

New Dem Principles

- 1. Build more homes and get them on the market fast
 - a. Quickly increase supply where there is greatest demand;
 - b. Incentivize the sale of homes so they don't sit vacant for months; and
 - c. Make it easier to redevelop or rehabilitate housing stock.
- 2. Make it easier to buy or rent a home
 - a. Improve mortgage products so buyers can access lower rates; and
 - b. Examine the drivers of insurance risk to address root causes and lower costs;
- 3. Improve housing data and transparency so we can surge resources where needed
 - a. Collect data across the federal government to see where people are being displaced from evictions, foreclosures, and disasters; and
 - b. Enhance data on insurance so there is greater transparency on rate changes.

Policy Priorities

• Build more homes and get them on the market fast to meet housing demand and fill the gap of millions of missing homes. Federal policy should lower barriers, incentivize housing development, and position the federal government as a partner in land use.
